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MISSIONARIES AND PASTORAL WORKERS KILLED IN 2025

Vatican City (Agenzia Fides) – As the Jubilee of Hope draws to a close, Fides publishes its annual report on Catholic missionaries and pastoral workers who were violently killed worldwide in the past 365 days.

The news about the lives and circumstances of these individuals' violent deaths offers a glimpse into everyday life in contexts often marked by violence, misery, and a lack of justice. These are often witnesses and missionaries who voluntarily offered their lives to Christ until the very end.

GENERAL INFORMATION

According to data verified by Fides, 17 missionaries were killed worldwide in 2025, including priests, women religious, seminarians, and lay people. The breakdown by continent shows that the highest number of pastoral workers killed in 2025 was in Africa, where ten missionaries (six priests, two seminarians, and two catechists) were murdered. Four missionaries were killed in the Americas (two priests and two nuns), and two in Asia (one priest and one layperson). One priest was killed in Europe.

From 2000 to 2025, a total of 626 missionaries and pastoral workers were killed.

The annual list proposed by Fides, as it has been for some time, does not refer only to missionaries and pastoral workers “ad gentes” in the strict sense, but considers the term “missionary” in a broader context, encompassing all Catholics who were involved in some way in pastoral works and ecclesial activities and who died violently, even if they did not die expressly “in hatred of the faith”.

For this reason, we prefer not to use the term “martyrs”, if not in its etymological meaning of “witness”, in order not to enter into the question of the judgment that the Church might eventually deliver upon some of them. Likewise, we use the term “missionary” for all the baptized, in the awareness that “in virtue of their baptism, all the members of the People of God have become missionary disciples (cf. Mt 28:19). All the baptized, whatever their position in the Church or their level of instruction in the faith, are agents of evangelization.” (Pope Francis, Apostolic Exhortation *Evangelii gaudium*, §120).

OVERVIEW OF CONTINENTS BASED ON PASTORAL WORKERS KILLED

AFRICA

Ten missionaries were killed in Africa: six priests, two seminarians, and two catechists

NB. The report on missionaries killed in 2024 did not include the name of Father Tobias Chukwujekwu Okonkwo, a priest and pharmacist, killed near Ihiala, Nigeria, on the evening of December 26, 2024.

Burkina Faso (2)

- **Mathias Zongo and Christian Tientga**, two catechists who were travelling by motorbike with two other catechists were killed on January 25. The four pastoral workers of the parish of Ouakara were allegedly attacked by a group of armed men while they were near the town of Bondokuy.

Nigeria (5)

- **Father Sylvester Okechukwu**, diocesan priest, parish priest of St. Mary Tachira Church, Kaura Local Government Area, Kaduna State, Nigeria.

According to a statement from the Diocese of Kafanchan, Father Okechukwu was kidnapped in his residence in Tachira on March 4, 2025, between 9.15 pm and 9.40 pm. His lifeless body was found on March 5.

- **Andrew Peter, a 21-year-old seminarian**, was murdered by kidnappers who had abducted him along with Philip Ekweli from the rectory of St. Peter's Catholic Church in Iviukhua-Agenebode, Etsako East County, Edo State: the gunmen attacked both the rectory and the church. The two were taken to nearby forests. Father Ekweli was released by the kidnappers on March 13. The news of the seminarian's murder was released by the Diocese of Auchi on 17 March.

- **Father Godfrey Chukwuma Oparaekwe**, parish priest of St. Ambrose Church in Ubakala (Umuahia South LGA), in Abia State (southern Nigeria), was killed while attempting to mediate a family dispute on the evening of June 17.

- **Father Matthew Eya**, parish priest of St. Charles Church in Eha-Ndiagu (Nigeria), was shot on the evening of September 19 along the Eha-Alumonah–Eha-Ndiagu road, in the local government area of Nsukka, in Enugu State, southeastern Nigeria.

- **Emmanuel Alabi**, a seminarian, lost his life due to circumstances related to his kidnapping. Abducted on July 10 in the attack on the Immaculate Conception Minor Seminary in Ivianokpodi, belonging to the diocese of Auchi, in Edo State, the young man died from injuries sustained during his capture. The news of Emmanuel Alabi's tragic death was confirmed by the Diocese of Auchi on 5 November.

Kenya (1)

- **Father Alloyce Cheruiyot Bett** was shot dead in the Tot area of the Kerio Valley, in the Elgeyo Marakwet County, in the Western Highlands of Kenya. The murder occurred on May 22, at the end of the Holy Mass in the small Christian community in the village of Kakkiken, when several gunmen fired shots, one of which hit Father Bett in the neck, killing him instantly

Sierra Leone (1)

- **Father Augustine Dauda Amadu** was killed between 2 and 3 a.m. on the night of August 29-30 in his home in the Burma 3 neighborhood on the outskirts of Kenema, Sierra Leone.

Sudan (1)

- **Father Luka Jomo**, parish priest in the besieged city of El Fasher, in Darfur (western Sudan), killed by a stray bullet that took his life and that of two other young people.

AMERICA

Four missionaries were killed in America: two priests and two nuns

Haiti (2)

- **Evanette Onezaire and Jeanne Voltaire**, two nuns who belonged to the Little Sisters of Saint Thérèse of the Child Jesus, were murdered by armed gangs in Mirebalais, about fifty kilometers northeast of the Haitian capital, Port-au-Prince.

Mexico (1)

- **Father Bertoldo Pantaleón Estrada**, who disappeared on October 4 in Cocula, Guerrero State, Mexico, was found murdered on October 6 between the towns of Zumpango and Mezcala.

United States (1)

- **Father Arul Carasala**, parish priest of Saints Peter and Paul Church in Seneca, a city in northeastern Kansas (USA), was shot and killed on April 3 by a man while he was in his rectory.

ASIA

Two missionaries were killed in Asia: one priest and one layperson

Myanmar (1)

- **Father Donald Martin**, a 44-year-old diocesan priest of the Archdiocese of Mandalay, is the first Burmese Catholic priest killed in the civil conflict that is bloodying the country. His lifeless body, mutilated and disfigured by stab wounds, was found yesterday, February 14 at 6 pm, by parishioners in the grounds of the parish of Our Lady of Lourdes, where he was the parish priest.

Philippines (1)

- **Mark Christian Malaca**, a teacher at St. Stephen Academy, a Catholic school in the city of Laur. Malaca, 39, was shot dead on November 4 by unknown assailants in the village of San Juan, where he lived.

Poland (1)

- **Father Grzegorz Dymek**, 58, was found strangled in the rectory on February 13. The priest had been serving in the parish of Our Lady of Fatima since its foundation in 1998.

BIOGRAPHICAL NOTES AND CIRCUMSTANCES OF DEATH

Fides Agency is and will be grateful to all those who wish to report updates or corrections to this list or to those of previous years.

NB. We report some biographical notes on Father Tobias Chukwujekwu Okonkwo, the Nigerian priest killed on December 26, 2024, who was not included in last year's dossier

Father Tobias Chukwujekwu Okonkwo, a priest and pharmacist, a professional in the service of public health. He ran various health facilities, such as the nursing and midwifery schools and the medical laboratory of the Our Lady of Lourdes Hospital in Ihiala. He had completed his internship just two months before his murder. He was shot dead in the street on the evening of December 26, during the liturgical feast of St. Stephen, the first martyr. Father Tobias was approached by a group of unidentified persons while driving on the Onitsha-Owerri Expressway, in Ihiala, in southeastern Nigeria. (Agenzia Fides, 31/12/2024)

Mathias Zongo and Christian Tientga, two catechists who were travelling by motorbike with two other catechists. The four pastoral workers of the parish of Ouakara were allegedly attacked by a group of armed men while they were near the town of Bondokuy on January 25, 2025. The two surviving catechists reportedly managed to escape into the forest. After being alerted, the parish priest found the lifeless bodies of the two murdered men. One of the murdered catechists had seven children, the other was the father of three children. (Agenzia Fides, 17/2/2025)

Father Sylvester Okechukwu, parish priest of St. Mary Tachira Church, Kaura Local Government Area, Kaduna State, Nigeria.

According to a statement from the Diocese of Kafanchan, Father Okechukwu was kidnapped in his residence in Tachira on March 4, 2025, between 9.15 pm and 9.40 pm. His lifeless body was found on March 5. Father Jacob Shanet, Chancellor of the Diocese of Kafanchan, remembers him with these words: "Father Sylvester was a dedicated servant of God, who worked selflessly in the vineyard of the Lord, spreading the message of peace, love and hope. He was always available and accessible to his parishioners. His untimely death has left an indelible void within our diocesan family, and we share in the pain of his passing with his family, friends and all those who knew and loved him." (Agenzia Fides, 6/3/2025).

Andrew Peter, a 21-year-old seminarian, was murdered by kidnappers who had abducted him along with Philip Ekweli from the rectory of St. Peter's Catholic Church in Iviukhua-Agenebode, Etsako East County, Edo State, Nigeria at approximately 9:30 p.m. on March 3. The two were taken to nearby forests. According to a statement from the Diocese of Auchi, "Father Philip Ekweli was released by his kidnappers around 4 p.m. on Thursday, March 13, near the village of Amughe, a few kilometers from the town of Okpekpe, North Ibie in the Etsako East LGA of Edo State, ending ten days of captivity at the hands of his kidnappers." "Unfortunately the 21-year-old major seminarian, Andrew Peter, who was kidnapped along with Fr Ekweli, was gruesomely murdered by the abductors." (Agenzia Fides, 5/3/2025 and 17/3/2025).

Father Alloyce Cheruiyot Bett was shot dead in the Tot area of the Kerio Valley, in the Elgeyo Marakwet County, in the Western Highlands of Kenya. The murder occurred on May 22, at the end of the Holy Mass in the small Christian community in the village of Kakkiken, when several gunmen fired shots, one of which hit Father Bett in the neck, killing him instantly.

Kenyan police said they have arrested six people in connection with the priest's murder. While it is suspected that it was an attempted robbery, a police spokesperson emphasized that Father Bett's murder was in no way connected to the cattle thefts or other forms of banditry in the area. Father Alloyce was likely killed because he was denouncing banditry in the area.

Born on February 29, 1992, in the village of Manman, he attended Manman Primary School from 1997 to 2007. In 2008, he entered Mogoiywo Primary School, where he obtained his secondary school diploma (KCPE). He continued his secondary studies in Kimaren from 2009 to 2012. He was consecrated to the Lord by his father Joseph Kiptoo when he was one year old. His faith blossomed as a child, and he loved serving as an altar boy. During primary school, he was appointed assistant catechist. In high school, he was an active member of the Young Christian Students (YCS) association, where he served as organizational secretary and later president. After high school, he entered Christ the King Major Seminary in Nyeri from 2013 to 2022. As a seminarian, he worked at the Holy Family Parish in Kapsowar, the parishes of St. Don Bosco in Kaptagat and the Holy Trinity in Kaiboi. On January 6, 2022, he was ordained a deacon. On November 5, 2022, he was ordained a priest at the Shrine of Mary Queen of Peace in Kabiyet. After his priestly ordination, he served as parish assistant at the parish of St. Paul Salient from December 2022 to June 2023, and as chaplain at St. Peters Marakwet Boys School from July 2023 to October 2024. In November 2024, he was appointed founder and first parish priest of the parish of St. Mathias Mulumba, where he served until his assassination. (Agenzia Fides, 23/5/2025).

Father Luka Jomo, parish priest in the besieged city of El Fasher, in Darfur (western Sudan), was killed by a stray bullet that took his life and that of two other young people on June 13. El Fasher, the capital of North Darfur, considered to be the last stronghold of the Sudan Armed Forces (SAF) in the region, controlled almost entirely by the rival Rapid Support Forces (RSF) of General Mohamed Hamdan "Hemedti" Dagalo who continuously bombed the city. (Agenzia Fides, 16/6/2025).

Father Godfrey Chukwuma Oparaekwe was killed in Nigeria while attempting to mediate a family dispute on the evening of June 17.

Father Godfrey was born on October 4, 1953, in Ulakwo, Owerri, Nigeria, the sixth of seven children of Simeon and Rose Oparaekwe of Umuovum, Ulakwo-Obube, North Owerri, Imo State. He was baptized on November 21, 1960, in the Church of St. Dominic in Yaba-Lagos and took the name "GODFREY" (from Old English), meaning "PEACE OF GOD." He was ordained a priest in 1983 at St. Joseph Seminary of Ulakwo, Owani, Nigeria, in the Diocese of Umuahia. In 2000, he received a Master's degree in Theology from the Franciscan University of Steubenville, Arizona. From 2002 to 2012, he held various positions in the Diocese of Tucson, Arizona (USA), and then returned to Nigeria. (Agenzia Fides, 24/6/2025).

Father Augustine Dauda Amadu was robbed in his home in the Burma 3 neighborhood on the outskirts of Kenema, Sierra Leone. According to police, a parishioner called the local police station at 7:45 a.m. The man reported that Father Amadu had been attacked by unknown armed men in his rectory during the night. Investigators reported that the attackers forced their way into the house through a window. According to police, the priest was killed between 2 and 3 a.m. on the night of August 29-30.

Father Augustine was very popular for his helpfulness and kindness. He was committed to helping disadvantaged youth and families, and his sermons against corruption and crime earned him great respect, but, according to parishioners, also enemies in certain circles.

Kenema is the capital of the Eastern Province of the West African state of Sierra Leone, as well as the district of the same name. Recently, the region has seen a sharp increase in violent crimes such as armed robberies and assaults, which are affecting the security of local communities. (Agenzia Fides, 2/9/2025)

Father Matthew Eya, parish priest of St. Charles Church in Eha-Ndiagu (Nigeria), was the victim of a full-scale ambush on the evening of September 19th. The priest was returning to his parish when at least two armed men on a motorcycle overtook his car, shot the tires, and, after forcing the car to stop, shot him several times at close range. If the sequence of events recounted by witnesses is correct, this was not a failed kidnapping attempt, but a targeted assassination.

Born in Umura, Ugbaiké, Enugu State, on January 1, 1986, he was the fourth of seven children. Matthew was fascinated by the Catholic faith during his secondary school studies thanks to an encounter with Father Charles Ushi, parish priest of St. Anthony's Church in Ugbaiké. In 2000, he received baptism, confirmation, and first communion. Since he came from a poor, non-Catholic family, the future priest initially had some difficulty entering the seminary to pursue his priestly vocation. In order to earn some money, he taught mathematics between 2004 and 2006 in various schools. Finally, in 2006, he applied to St. John Cross Minor Seminary in Nsukka, where he topped the entrance exam. His studies were financed thanks to Father Collins Uchenna Okeke, a Nigerian priest who worked in Ecorse, United States, and an American benefactor, Mrs. Mary Sheipline. In 2007, Father Matthew completed his studies at the minor seminary and continued his philosophical studies at the Major Seminary in Awka. In 2015, he then began his studies at the Bigard Memorial Seminary in Enugu. After becoming a priest, Father Matthew served in several parishes in the diocese of Nsukka, before being appointed parish priest of St. Charles Church in Eha-Ndiagu. (Agenzia Fides, 22/9/2025).

Emmanuel Alabi, a Nigerian seminarian, was kidnapped on the night of July 10, when the Minor Seminary of the Immaculate Conception, Ivianokpodi, was attacked by armed bandits. During the attack, three seminarians—Japhet Jesse, Joshua Aleobua, and Emmanuel Alabi—were kidnapped. The Diocese of Auchi announced the release of Japhet Jesse, which occurred a few days after the kidnapping, and subsequently that of Joshua Aleobua, who was released on November 4. In its statement, the diocese announced the death of seminarian Emmanuel Alabi, "who lost his life during the kidnapping." In a conversation with Fides, the chancellor of the diocese of Auchi, Father Jude Sule, reconstructed the circumstances of the seminarian's death. "According to information provided by the seminarian who has since been released, Emmanuel, who was injured during the attack on the seminary, felt exhausted during the forced march imposed by his kidnappers and was unable to continue the journey with them. As a result, he was left at a specific location. When the kidnappers returned the next day to collect him, they found him dead." (Agenzia Fides, 5/11/2025 and 10/11/2025)

Fr. Donald Martin, a 44-year-old diocesan priest of the Archdiocese of Mandalay, is the first Burmese Catholic priest killed in the civil conflict that is bloodying the country. His lifeless body, mutilated and disfigured by stab wounds, was found yesterday, February 14 at 6 pm, by parishioners in the grounds of the parish of Our Lady of Lourdes, where he was the parish priest. The church is located in the village of Kan Gyi Taw, in the territory of the Shwe Bo district, which is part of the Sagaing region. The man was violently and cruelly stabbed several times. The bloody manner in which the killing was carried out suggests a targeted attack for reasons that have yet to be investigated, just as the killers have yet to be identified: not an easy task in a context of widespread violence.

Father Donald Martin was ordained a priest in 2018. In this period of civil war, he carried out his task as pastor of souls with zeal, fidelity and obedience, administering the sacraments in the parish and trying to be close to the suffering community. Furthermore, like so many other priests, he dedicated himself to humanitarian assistance to displaced people scattered throughout the territory, bringing them spiritual consolation and material aid. (Agenzia Fides, 15/2/2025 and 17/2/2025).

Mark Christian Malaca, a teacher at St. Stephen Academy, a Catholic school in the city of Laur, part of the diocese of Cabanatuan, in the province of Nueva Ecija, in the center of the island of Luzon, in the Philippines, was shot dead on November 4 by unknown assailants in the village of San Juan, where he lived. According to initial investigations, the killers, wearing black jackets, helmets, and face masks, approached and fired several shots at the victim. Malaca was known for his faith and his commitment to education.

Evanette Onezaire and Jeanne Voltaire, two nuns who belonged to the Little Sisters of Saint Thérèse of the Child Jesus, were murdered by armed gangs in Mirebalais on March 31, about fifty kilometers northeast of the Haitian capital, Port-au-Prince. According to local media reports, the two nuns were working at the school in Mirebalais and had taken refuge in a house with a girl during the attacks. However, members of the armed gangs entered the building, opened fire, and killed the two nuns and all the other people present.

Father Arul Carasala, parish priest of Saints Peter and Paul Church in Seneca, a city in northeastern Kansas (USA), was shot and killed on April 3 by a man while he was in his rectory. According to initial reports, the priest was killed by an elderly man, unknown to the parishioners.

Father Arlu Carasala was ordained a priest in 1994 in India, his home country, and had been serving in Kansas since 2004. He became a U.S. citizen in 2011, the year during which he became parish priest of Saints Peter and Paul Church in Seneca, a town of a few thousand inhabitants. The Metropolitan Archbishop of Kansas City, Joseph Naumann, described the murder in a post on his social media channels as a “senseless act of violence” that left the community “in mourning for the loss of a beloved priest” who was also “a friend”. “Father Carasala was a devoted and zealous pastor who faithfully served our Archdiocese for over twenty years, as well as serving as dean in the Nemaha-Marshall region.”

Father Arul played a key role in helping missionary priests become inculturated. Many missionary priests from India stayed with him for a couple of months before going to work in parishes. He was a member of the board of directors and the presbyteral council representing missionary priests.

Father Bertoldo Pantaleón Estrada, who disappeared on October 4 in Cocula, Guerrero State, Mexico, was found murdered on October 6 between the towns of Zumpango and Mezcala, on a dirt road near kilometre 199 of the Mexico Federal Highway. Father Bertoldo was parish priest of San Cristóbal, Mezcala, in the diocese of Chilpancingo-Chilapa.

Father Grzegorz Dymek, 58, was found strangled in the rectory. The priest had been serving in the parish of Our Lady of Fatima since its foundation in 1998. The church is located in Kłobuck, a town in southern Poland on the outskirts of Częstochowa.

On the evening of Thursday 13 February, the police were alerted after hearing screams coming from the rectory. When they arrived at the scene, they found the lifeless body of the parish priest and a man who had attempted to flee. The man was a 52-year-old former police officer, dismissed in 2001 for disciplinary reasons, who later confessed to the murder of the priest, whose death was caused by suffocation.

During his last Masses, Father Dymek had publicly announced that approximately 80,000 zloty, equivalent to almost 20,000 euros, had been collected for the needs of the parish. The murder of the parish priest appears to have been the result of a robbery attempt that ended tragically.

REPORT 1990-2025

According to data available to Fides, in the ten years from 1980 to 1989, 115 missionaries were violently murdered. The real number is undoubtedly higher, as the data refer to cases for which verifiable information is available. The summary list for the years 1990-2000 shows a total of 604 missionaries killed. This figure is considerably higher than in the previous decade, due to several factors, including the 1994 genocide in Rwanda, in which at least 248 church workers died. The table below shows the total number of pastoral workers murdered in 1994: in addition to the 248 in Rwanda (3 bishops, 103 priests, 47 religious brothers, 65 nuns and 30 members of institutes of consecrated life), there are 26 murdered in all other Countries of the world. In the years from 2000 to 2025, the total number of pastoral workers murdered is 626.
